



# Have YOU signed up for auto-pay and received your FREE newsletter ad? What are you waiting for?

In response to a member survey, the Chamber has launched a new way to conveniently pay your membership investment. Members can choose to deduct the payment from bank account or credit card <u>securely stored offsite via Authorize.net</u>. You'll also be able to opt in to the billing frequency of choice: monthly, quarterly or annually.

#### Auto pay must be set up at least 30 days prior to the month of your membership renewal date\*.

You can sign up now, even if your renewal date is up to twelve months from today. Fill out the <u>Membership Investment</u> <u>Auto Pay Form</u>. Bank account EFT is preferred to avoid credit cards that expire and interrupt the deduction.

Your banking/credit card account is secure; the Chamber renews its PCI compliance annually. Only *membership* invoices are eligible for this option. All other Chamber invoices remain due within 15 days. And remember that you can pay those online as well.

#### Chamber's event cancellation policy

From time-to-time the Chamber has to cancel a planned event. Sometimes it's because the presenter has an un expected emergency, but usually it's because low registration doesn't justify asking a volunteer speaker to travel and for caterers to cook and set up a room for only a handful of attendees.

In those cases, we notify via email those who have registered for the event. Those who have not registered and show up at the venue will be inconvenienced and we apologize. Although we expect walk-ins at the event, we cannot predict how many there will be so we can't include that unknown number in our decision to hold or cancel an event. Often, had we known the number of unregistered walk-ins will attend, we would not have had to cancel the event.

We will not send a mass email about the cancellation of an event. At that point, we feel an obligation only to those who have registered. If you registered for an event, you will have received a reminder email, so there should be no question of whether or not you've registered.


Please understand that holding events is planned around knowing who commits to attending. Often, walk-ins impact the room

#### Featuring Ashley Manor Assisted Living

In the quaint, small town of Ashley, Ohio lies an assisted living home for the elderly. The owner, Debbie Fox, takes a lot of pride in her business and has a feeling of self accomplishment that she has been able to make such a promising home for people in need. "I felt like the elderly were somewhat forgotten and I wanted to give them and their family a place where they would feel safe and comfortable."

Mrs. Fox started <u>Ashley Manor Assisted Living</u> 10 years ago when her husband brought the idea up to her. "My husband and I are very goal-oriented people", she says, "we wanted a goal that could progress and grow into something that would help our community." The Ashley Manor is licensed to hold up to 16 residents who are non-combative, and who have slight behavioral and memory issues. When asked what her favorite part of the job was Mrs. Fox easily answered "the satisfaction I get from the personal care my residents receive and the appreciation they have for my help". Her second reason? "They make me laugh."

Mrs. Fox had no prior experience working with the elderly, only a strong passion. She always told herself that she wanted senior citizens to have the dignity they deserve and wanted them to live their last few years of life in a safe and caring environment. Mrs. Fox was motivated from the very start when she saw families cringing at the thought of putting their loved ones' in a nursing home. "Ashley Manor is a definite step-up from a nursing home", she says "we like giving our residents one on one care so they feel like they are being looked after nicely".

Ashley Manor also has two other twin buildings that house the same purpose, Galena Manor and Westerville Manor. Who runs these establishments you ask? Debbie Fox and her husband. This dynamic duo is so compassionate about their business that they decided to open up their own home to people in need. Mrs. Fox quotes "I am so proud that our dream has ex-

panded into three buildings and I can't wait to see what we have in store for the future". Mrs. Fox's goals for the Manor are to train the staff to be even more warming to the residents, seek new employment, and possibly search for new homes for even more residents. As for her long term goals Mrs. Fox would love to build in new neighborhoods and further her education with the elderly.

Many business owners view the word 'success' to have many meanings. Most of them would say that success is making the most money or stomping their competition into the ground, but for the Foxes it is quite simple: "success to us is seeing our work greatly impact these people's lives and seeing the appreciation they give us for doing something so simple to help them". Their contributions to the "outside world" are different too. This duo gives up all of their time to helping the elderly. Mrs. Fox said that she is personally open 24/7. She is always willing to give a helping hand and drop whatever she is doing to help someone that needs her. Many businesses also have to make hard decisions throughout their longevity. Mrs. Fox said that her business has had their fair share of difficult decisions. She says "I hate having to fire my staff, but if they do not want to be compassionate with my resident's then they get the boot". She also says "I dislike it so much when I a.) have to turn someone away from the resident home and b.) when there is nothing left that I can possibly do and I have to send someone to a nursing home". Mrs. Fox said that she does everything in her path to make her residents stay away from nursing homes, "they don't get the one on one care 24/7 that I give them here at the homes, it bothers me to think that these helpless people get put on the back burner". When asked why the Ashley Manor was better than the rest of their competition, Mrs. Fox seemed to answer the guestion with ease. She simply said "We are so involved with our residents and what they do on an everyday basis. We do not

tolerate anything but the best from our staff and our staff only treats our residents with the utmost respect and attention". The Ashley Manor also has a little someone that makes the home feel even more warm and inviting: Ashley; the therapeutic dog. Ashley was adopted from the Delaware Humane Society because a resident of the home wanted a dog but knew he would not be able to take care of one all by himself. Mrs. Fox was kind enough to have adopted the dog and the dog is now just another piece of the family puzzle.

Mrs. Fox made it very clear that she has great compassion for her homes and that she is so excited to see what is in store for the future. "My doors are always open and I am always willing to give that extra helping hand."



We began Education Day at the Orange Branch of the <u>Delaware County District Library</u> with participants meeting with the Superintendents of the local school districts and the <u>Delaware Area Career Center</u>. <u>Delaware County</u> is one of the fastest growing counties in Ohio with over 30,000 students enrolled in the local school districts. In addition to serving such a large number of students, the school district can boast about having a graduation rate of 96% while being in 4 of the lowest spending districts per pupil in Central Ohio.

As beneficial as the growth in Delaware County is for the economy, it's causing school districts to experience growing pains. Big Walnut Superintendent, Angie Pollock, shared research that predicts the Big Walnut school district will grow by approximately 70% over the next 10 years. **Buckeye Valley** school district just passed a levy in November (by 2 votes) to build 2 new elementary schools, while Delaware City Schools currently has several schools under construction and Olentangy Local School District had to redistrict students over the summer to relieve over-crowding. Olentangy also has the honor of being the fastest growing district in the state of Ohio, and ac-

cording to Superintendent, Mark Raiff, is planning to go on the March 2016 ballot to ask voters to approve a bond issue that will provide funding to build a 4th high school. Growth, however, is not interfering with providing a quality education to students. Each school district's mission relates to preparing students for success in the future by maximizing each student's potential. -*Continued on next page*

Before leaving the Orange Library, participants were treated to a behind-the-scenes tour by Don and Paul and learned the library is a "green" building. In addition to being environmentally friendly, the Library offers patrons a variety of places to enjoy reading, including an outdoor green-space called the Inspiration Garden which features a statue of mythological characters, a cozy fireplace, a teen zone, and private study rooms. To help foster a love of books and reading in young children, the Library offers story time for toddlers and preschoolers as well as a variety of clubs and classes for older children.

A trend that seemed apparent throughout the day, was that "individualized" learning was surely the current focus and way of the future for current educators. The STEM Program (which stand for Science, Technology, Engineering, Math), is the latest method of this form of education by the Olentangy School District.

Although only in its early phase of development, the STEM program seems very successful at presenting another, hands-on focused way to educate the County's children. Children apply, and are chosen at random, to participate in this program, which is supplemental to a traditional classroom environment schedule. They have hands-on engineering classes, which included building models and problem solving, as well as electronic and computer skill development. Students are given a type of freedom to discover and learn for themselves what career path to take, which arguably can only be learned by experience.

Next we arrived at <u>Columbus State Community College</u> (CSCC) where we were greeted by Ms. Pat Fabrisi, and given a thorough tour of the beautiful campus. CSCC offers a personalized learning experience to its 1600 students by limiting class size to a maximum of 28 students. One can earn a full Bachelor of Arts degree right at this location, making the process of acquiring such a degree more convenient for Delaware residents. CSCC also offers many Associate's degrees and training programs. Virtual learning classrooms really showcased the campus' modern amenities, and made it clear that CSCC has much to offer its students.

Our trip continued at Delaware Area Career Center's North Campus, where Scott Palmer, Director of Adult Education Operations, provided an overview of the career center's programs and mission. DACC offers a range of career based training, GED, technology, and continuing education programs to high school students and adults throughout Delaware County. A delicious lunch was served by Juniors and Seniors currently enrolled in the Culinary Arts program led by instructor Patty Bace. After lunch, class members were given the option of touring several programs available at North Campus, including cosmetology, construction technology, fire service, and automotive technology.

Next we headed to the 7th and 8th Dempsey Middle School which has over 800 students. A new building is under construction at

the complex for 6th graders, which is scheduled to open next school year. Dr. Julie German, the principal greeted us as well as several students who gave us lanyards that stated the Dempsey Middle School theme for the year, "Be the Change". We were guided into the media center where members of the Dempsey Orchestra performed several holiday musical arrangements. The students then introduced themselves and detailed the activities that they are involved in as a student at Dempsey. Our group was broken down into smaller groups and taken on a student-led tour of the building. During the tour, we observed the history class reenacting the Second Continental Congress. The classroom was modified to look like it did in 1775 during the Continental Congress, as well as the teacher wearing clothing of that era, including a white long wig.

After our stop at Dempsey Middle School, we visited James Conger Elementary School located on the east side of Delaware. We met the Principal of the

school, Mr. Josh Page. We were divided into two groups and sent to two separate classrooms to get a taste of what is happening at Conger Elementary. Our first stop at Ms. Remlinger's classroom had the students currently learning problem solving techniques. Our next stop was Ms. Kuhn's classroom which has the kids completing tasks on their laptop computers throughout the week with the goal of achieving "Fun Friday."

Our final stop was The Ohio Wesleyan University Campus. We met our tour guides, Cole Hatcher with the Admissions Office and a current student. They took us on a walking tour of the newly renovated Merrick Hall located just east of University Hall/Gray Chapel. Merrick Hall was originally constructed of local blue limestone and opened in 1873 as their science building. It has been unused for the past 30 years until an anonymous alumnus gave a donation that allowed for its renovation that was completed this past August. It is now home of the OWU Connection, high tech classrooms, and a large event room on the third floor. Next our tour guides had us board our bus and took us for a driving tour of the campus which included many historical buildings and the construction site of new campus housing.



#### The Health & Wellness Initiative

Since that time, over 350 meetings, seminars and special events have featured health and wellness topics and have been attended by thousands of Ohio employers. Just a few of those topics included:

# Delaware Area Safety Council News

Beyond presenting health and wellness topics in their monthly meeting forum, many safety councils created unique wellness initiatives themselves. For example,

- In Northwest Ohio, a six-seminar Health & Wellness Seminar Series was developed that included wellness at work consultations, screenings, assessments and take-away resources.
- In Sandusky County, annual Health and Wellness Awards were presented to recognize employers who promoted and engaged employees in healthy options and health education.
- The Grand Lake and Van Wert communities combined their resources to bring a nationally recognized wellness speaker to their region Sara Martin Rauch Director of Strategy & Planning for the Wellness Council of America (WELCOA).
- In Portage County, as a result of a coalition among many local resources, a 24-page 'Engaging Your Workforce in Wellness!' publication was created to make a case for implementing health and wellness programs.

In Summit County, safety council attendees attended a presentation on reducing stress from "America's Nutrition Leader" Zonya Foco after visiting an on-site blood pressure station.

Choosing to live a healthier life can result in significant change. It's not just about being better prepared to bounce back from an occupational injury. It can mean losing 11 pounds, as it did for one person giving up pop in a 30-Day 'Water Challenge' or several attendees participating in a skin cancer screening who were identified as having pre-cancerous spots who were advised to seek immediate treatment.

The safety council health and wellness initiative has raised awareness, improved the culture of health across the state and equipped people to fulfill their highest potential in work and life.
